GUIDELINES FOR POSTER PRESENTATIONS

- Posters are juried and will be show-cased during two sessions of the conference.
- Posters must fit on a 4' X 8' board. Posters should be done in Microsoft Power Point and either be displayed as a single poster or individually printed power point slides.
- Lettering should be large enough to be legible from a distance of 4-6 feet.
- Poster sessions are educational; promotional items such as consulting services and/or products will not be permitted.

A written abstract of no more than 250 words (not including title, names and affiliations) describing your poster must be submitted by **Friday, January 20, 2012**. Please submit your abstract via email to: **hmiltiades@csufresno.edu**. Include the following in the abstract:
